St Piran's Monumental Journey

On May 5th the sun shone down on Mabe as it prepared to send a

statue of St Piran on its way to the Valley of The Saints in Brittany. The statue was commissioned from France to be its 100th statue and to celebrate the Celtic roots of Brittany, Cornwall and Ireland.

The statue was hand-carved by David Paton and Stephane Rouget using granite from our own Mabe quarry. The ancient craft of hand chiselling is rarely seen on such a large scale.

The carving was completed in Tim Marsh's quarry on Antron Hill and it

Parish Council news

Antron Way development plans resubmitted

The Parish Council will be holding a special planning meeting at the beginning of June to discuss a number of large planning applications which we have received.

These include revised plans for the land off Antron Way, for 27 dwellings, and an application to build student accommodation alongside retail and 'flexible working space' and a health centre at Century House, Parkengue on the Kernick Industrial Estate.

Both applications are likely to have a significant impact on the parish, and residents are encouraged to come and express their views at the meeting, as well as registering comments on the Cornwall Council planning portal.

Annual Parish Meeting

This was held immediately prior to the monthly council meeting in May, and was well attended since local groups which had received a parish grant last year had been invited to come and update councillors on how the money had been spent. We all enjoyed hearing how council funds had been used to benefit local projects.

Community Hall gets a state-of-the-art boiler

MYCP have installed a new state of the art boiler system, funded by a £7,000 grant from the Falmouth Packet's parent company, Newsquest, in the Community Hall that will increase the efficiency of the building by up to a half.

Keith Bryant, chairman of the MYCP, said: "For a community who is struggling with money, we are very grateful for the grant. The old boiler needed human intervention to get it to work. We're super efficient now, with one of the most efficient boilers going. In summer, we won't even be using gas, just solar. It will cut our heating bills by a third if not half."

Mabe Councillor votes for Stadium for Cornwall

Mabe's Councillor, Peter Williams, has voted to spend £3m of public money on the Stadium for Cornwall.

Sixty-nine Cornwall councillors voted in favour of the project with forty-one voting against, seven abstaining and five absent, meaning that the Stadium will now go ahead.

Grosvenor Knowles obituary

Grosvenor Knowles sadly passed away on Sunday 6th May 2018, very peacefully.

We are all so very sorry for all the family. He was very much a family man, and along with Heather they had two sons plus grand-children. He enjoyed their visits and traveling to see them as often as possible, often cooking for them on his bar-b-q with a glass of red wine.

Grosvenor, with his two sisters Elizabeth and Susan, grew up on a farm at Lower Spargo Mabe, and along with a number of us attended Mabe School. Later in the 60's playing football for Mabe Athletic, where we started raising funds for a new ground and building.

Grosvenor spent his working life working at Sid Knowles Transport, helping to run the office of the family business, later he continued to work in his retirement with Nick Ferris.

In 1971 when the present Community Project was created, involving all organisations within the Parish of Mabe, the Football Club moved their Building Funds across to the new organisations, which gave the committee a reasonable starting balance.

In those days there were many fund raising events, the main

being the Village Carnival, where Grosvenor always arranged a number of lorries for the parade. Following this, we ran the Mabe Shindig, and again Grosvenor arranged lorries diggers etc. to assemble the event. He also had an old tractor which he renovated and displayed. An item he will always be remembered for, was running the traditional very famous "Pig Roast" and there are some wonderful stories to tell from these events.

In 1985 we needed help to move and assemble our first community hall, the old temporary classroom from the old Mabe School.

On Saturday afternoons he would transport different sections to our new site. Then we needed a road/parking area created and he supplied lories to transport hard core etc. from the then Penryn Granite Quarry, to our present site.

During those years he was also running a boys football team in the village, often taking them to Carn Brea Saturday evenings to play 5-a-side. His team was still running when we opened the new sports pitch, and he arranged a special youth tournament on the opening weekend. Also at the opening of the ground, he played in the one off, Village Cricket team. He was also playing for Penryn Cricket Club, where he and Heather enjoyed much of their leisure time.

In recent years, on retirement, he has been very involved with Mabe Youth & Community Project as a committee member, and Vice-Chairman of the Mabe Short Mat and Carpet Bowls Clubs, all of which will miss him so very much, as we all will within the village.

Humphrey arrives at Flicka!

Flicka are honoured to welcome this young Poitou donkey, especially as he is the brother of Big Bertie, who already lives at Flicka.

They are both Baudet de Poitou's - probably the most famous, oldest and most rare breed of donkey in the world. First recordings of their existence were in 54CB when the Romans discovered them in Poitiers, France.

The Poitevine Mule (a cross between the Poitou donkey and the Mulassier horse) was in great demand from the middle ages onward. Large numbers of mules

were used by the French army in the Congo and North Africa, and the Poitou Donkey was exported to many countries including the USA. But by the 1950s there was little demand for the mules as they had been replaced by mechanized lorries, tractors and jeeps. Thousands of them were culled including the Poitou. This was catastrophic, and when a study was undertaken in 1977 it was found that only around 40 Poitous had survived and the breed was on the very verge of extinction.

A concerted rescue plan was established in France and numbers

have risen slowly, but today there are still only a few hundred Poitou Donkeys in France and a few other countries including England. All still have their original French papers; if a donkey does not, it is not a Poitou!
